After two years of helping local entrepreneurs start, grow, and thrive - rather, survive - through the pandemic, we were able to refocus in 2022 on connecting enterprising individuals across Western North Carolina with the capital, capacity, and connections needed to realize their entrepreneurial potential.

While still harnessing our newly gained digital and remote capabilities, we were thrilled to get aspiring entrepreneurs back around the table together for our Foundations and other cohort programs. Our team was shoulder-to-shoulder with our clients in their shops and studios in towns throughout our WNC mountains. We co-hosted the first in-person Outdoor Economy Conference in several years, with more than 700 people coming together in Cherokee, NC. And for the first time ever in person, we were able to convene the 50+ founders of color in the Multicultural Catalyst Fund and Cohort programs.

It has been such a joy to work with so many creative entrepreneurs that aren't just helping our region rebound, but that are enabling our local economy to flourish. A few of these individuals are profiled herein: Hannah, who is connecting the arts economy in Canton, and Sala, who launched a contemporary fashion brand in Asheville. You'll also meet Joe, who opened a new local food market and cafe in Boone, and finally Colin, who is taking the helm of a beloved outdoor company. All are examples of great businesses building stronger communities.

These represent just a few of the 1,342 local businesses we assisted during the year, and who helped us reach a major milestone: **over \$100 million in financing provided to local small businesses since our founding in 1989!** Yes, that is a lot of microloans, and now a good number of larger loans as well. It is also a testament to the creative, entrepreneurial, and local-loving spirit found throughout the WNC mountains region.

Every summer, Mountain BizWorks conducts the WNC Local Business Impact Survey to better understand the current state of small business and to assess the impacts of our programs. This year's survey carried increased significance as local businesses rebound from the acute challenges of the pandemic. We received responses from 551 local businesses, a new record for the survey.

Milestones

- Surpassed \$100M in financing provided to local businesses over the lifetime of Mountain BizWorks
- Awarded the SBA Microlender of the Year Award
- Recorded largest regular lending year ever: **\$10.6M** with 99% of funding going to target markets of woman-owned and BIPOC businesses and rural and low-income entrepreneurs
- Launched new High Gear rapid loan offering to help existing businesses take advantage of time sensitive opportunities
- Established new lending partnerships with CornerSquare Community Capital and Invest Appalachia
- Assisted all **1,024 businesses that received PPP relief** via Mountain BizWorks to complete their PPP forgiveness application process

- Provided training for over 661 area craft and creative professionals through Craft Your Commerce
- Held **59 total classes and workshops**
- Published 2022 Local Impact Survey featuring 551 participants
- Saw over **1,000 people attended** Mountain BizWorks events, including the Catalyst Showcase, Outdoor Economy Conference, Mountain Raise, and the Year End Celebration

The Multicultural Catalyst Program formed in 2020 as a pilot program designed to support BIPOC entrepreneurs. In its first two years, the program supplied \$1.7M in loans to 47 businesses, created over 100 jobs, provided \$35K in technical assistance, and supported 42 businesses through four Catalyst Cohorts. After two years of hard work and successes, Mountain BizWorks announced the program would become a permanent offering in the spring of 2022.

With 600+ attendees from 26 states and three sovereign nations, the April 2022 Outdoor Economy Conference was NC's largest economic development conference last year. Attendees enjoyed informative programming and catalytic networking, a Trail Planning & Development Workshop, a 16,000 square foot Expo, and immersive field experiences. The conference concluded with the inaugural Higher Education and the Outdoor Industry Summit, a roundtable addressing workforce training and educational opportunities to grow the outdoor industry.

In fall 2022, Blue Ridge Chair Works became the first business brokered through Market Advisors. See pages 13-14 for their story.



The night also included the launch of the brand new Mountain Raise Community Fund, which provided the first opportunity for attendees to make a live investment by vote in real time. Hannah, Cold Mountain Art Collective

Canton, Haywood County



Commercial real estate was not Hannah Burnisky's initial goal, but working at home took it's toll: "I was a potter and a mom simultaneously, and I had no separation there...I really wanted a little space for myself. Just a little space to get out of home and work," reflected Hannah.





Born and raised in WNC, Hannah began looking at buildings in downtown Canton where she and her family had settled. The first place that popped up was the future home of Cold Mountain Art Collective. She shared, "I was like, this is it...but it was way bigger than I needed." That got her thinking about the times people asked to utilize her kiln or wheel. "I knew that there was a need for people to have access to that kind of equipment that they didn't have otherwise. So, I thought you know what? Let's make this bigger and make it a community thing."

Now, Cold Mountain Art Collective hosts community classes, shared kiln space, and a gallery of local art at her space at 33 Adams St. in Canton. Visit coldmountainartcollective.com for more information.

Sala Amira Menaya-Merritt's business - like so many - started small. "I love things that are different and unique, whether it is clothing, jewelry or the furniture," she shared. "So, I began to create in the basement of my home."

After encouragement from local sales of her work-of-art necklaces and other items, she left her full-time job in October 2021 to devote her time to It's Amira M: "It was time for me to do something that I really love, and creating is what I love."



Mountain BizWorks helped with funding for that initial leap - providing Sala working capital and equipment purchases through the Catalyst Fund. She also participated in a Catalyst Cohort: "You realize that you are not alone in this thing called entrepreneurship." Now, she's a part of other business owners' stories as a Catalyst Cohort Facilitator and Business Coach.

"Our general approach is whenever we identify another product or a category for the store that we want to sell, we look locally first. So, our first stop would be someone here in Boone, then the High Country, and so on... Small producers - whether they're farmers or jewelry or coffee roasters or dairy farmers - all that stuff is happening up here."

Connected to Mountain BizWorks through our High Country office lending team, Joe has since completed the ScaleUp and Invested courses. He's taken business investment seriously, with their store manager now owning an equity stake. He wants to extend that to other managers as they grow. "In the spirit of the real community project - to be operated by the people that have an interest in the business - there's no higher level of appreciation. I view my team as our greatest asset."

Alan Davis, founder of Blue Ridge Chair Works, decided to retire last year. Through Market Advisors, he began exploring his options for succession and the sale of the business he built. Now, Colin Buxton is at the helm.



Colin got to know Market Advisors Director Chris Grasinger personally, and Chris recognized the potential partnership. "He introduced me to Alan to kind of try things on to see if we would mesh well, " shared Colin. An avid outdoor enthusiast and trained woodworker, Colin's passions are combined in Blue Ridge Chair Works, and the relationship formed a great path for succession. Now, he crafts the company's products - including the beloved Blue Ridge Chair - by hand in his studio.



The Blue Ridge Chair Works story shows that entrepreneurship doesn't have to start from scratch. "I think the true draw to coming onto something that's already been around is joining in on the legacy, " said Colin. "Woodworking has traditionally been an apprenticeship trade. You work together until you're ready. I feel like Alan said, 'Okay you're ready. Here's the torch."

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







